

The St. Pauli Church Council held its monthly meeting on Thursday, June 20, 2013 at St. Pauli Church. Members present: Evie Johnson, Arlo Rude, Kathy Alberg, Barb Nelson and Pastor Carl Hansen. Meeting called to order by President Rude at 7:00 p.m.

Pastor Hansen opened by leading us in prayer.

#### Approval of Agenda

Agenda was presented by Rude. A motion to purchase a Paschal candle was added to New Business. Johnson made a motion to accept with the addition, Nelson seconded, motion carried.

#### Secretary's Report

Nelson presented the report. Alberg made a motion to accept, seconded by Johnson. Motion carried.

# Historic Minutes of the St. Pauli Congregation

#### **14 December 1908**

The St. Pauli Scandinavial Lutheran congregation held its 15th annual meeting in the church on December 14, 1908.

The meeting was opened by the new chairman of the congregation Pastor S. T. Palm with reading from the scriptures and prayer, after which the chairman declared the meeting opened and everyone free to speak.

The secretary read his report from the last annual meeting and the same was unanimously accepted without change.

The treasurer then read his report, which was also unanimously accepted.

From the report of the treasurer it was evident that during the past year not all had been received for the pastor's salary decided upon. The cash balance turned out to be roughly ca. \$200.00.

Proposed and supported and unanimously accepted to remit Hannah Lokken what she owed.

The chairman read his report and the same was accepted to enter into the minutes. Thereafter the congregation proceeded to elect officials.

Christ Moe was elected as trustee, as secretary the same, and treasurer, and sexton also with the same salary as before.

After this was elected a religion school committee as follows: C. Oien, A. A. Odegaard and Ole Helgeson. It was proposed and supported and unanimously accepted to appoint Mr. John Sjerva as advisory member.

Proposed and supported and unanimously accepted to elect Albert Odegaard as principal of the Sunday School with his father as assistant.

Proposed and supported and unanimously accepted that the congregation shall express its gratitude to its officials. Proposed and supported and accepted to elect the same cemetery committee as before.

After which was discussed the religion school at length. Finally it was proposed and supported and accepted that

there would be held two months religion school: one month in the church and one month in the schoolhouse west of the church.

Proposed and supported and accepted to decide the same pastor's salary as last year with the same supervising committee.

Proposed and supported and accepted to leave to the trustees to see to it that a privy was built and to find out what it will cost to build a steeple on the church and other necessary repairs.

After which the meeting was ended by the chairman with the Lord's prayer.

## Historic Minutes of the St. Pauli Luther League

The program opened with the singing of "Open Mine Eyes" by the congregation. President Fern Mathson led us in scripture and prayer. Several hymns were then sung by the congregation: "Beautiful Savior," "What a Friend We Have In Jesus," "My God How Wonderful Thou Art."

The business meeting opened with the secretary reading the minutes of the last meeting and also of the last annual meeting. This report was accepted as read.

The Treasurer's report was read by Mrs. Bjorge, in the absence of the treasurer, Marlyn Bjorge. A motion was made and seconded that the report be accepted as read.

A motion was made and seconded that we raise the organist's salary to \$2 per service.

A bylaw was added to the constitution giving the right to vote to those parents whose young folks have left home or those whose children are below confirmation age.

# We have new flooring!



The St. Pauli Congregation decided the tile flooring in the sanctuary was becoming too difficult for the ladies to continue to wash and wax on their hands and knees twice a year. At a special meeting, they chose to have the floor stripped of all the old wax and have a special epoxy coating put on top. At the same time, the interior would be painted and the red carpeting would be replaced throughout.

Arlo Rude built dollies in which the ends of the pews could be lifted and set in place, and the pews then rolled into position. He also built a framework on which the pews could be stacked in the narthex while the flooring was being replaced in the sanctuary. Several men from the congregation accomplished this move after worship services on August 4<sup>th</sup> (see photo below).

Once the pews were out, the baseboards were removed, tiles were patched where needed, and a crew was hired to do the stripping and epoxy work. Because this and the carpet laying

was going to take the better part of two weeks, no worship services were held on August 11<sup>th</sup> and outdoor services with a picnic were held on August 18<sup>th</sup>.

When the epoxy flooring had cured, the baseboards were re-installed and the men moved the pews back into their positions.

The altar, railing and pulpit were then moved down into the sanctuary area so that the old carpet could be removed and disposed of, and the installation of new carpeting could be accomplished. Because the new carpeting was glued down, the church windows were opened to give adequate ventilation. This was a necessary step, but due to the extremely dry weather it created additional work because everything on the main floor now had a layer of dust on it from the road or fields.

Once again, volunteers showed up to do the cleaning. Since the altar top was down on the floor and easily accessible, it also received a thorough cleaning. It is quite fragile, so some very patient people used q-tips with lemon oil to clean all of the intricate carvings.

## **Former Member Passes**



Ingeborg Margaret Johnson, 93, of Thief River Falls, MN died on Saturday, August 17, 2013 at Greenleaf Senior Living surrounded by her loving family. Most of us knew her as "Belle."

Funeral services were held on the anniversary of her 94<sup>th</sup> birthday, Monday, August 26, at 10:30 AM at Trinity Lutheran Church in Thief River Falls, with Reverend John Voelker officiating. Burial was held at Telemarken Church cemetery rural Goodridge.

Ingeborg Margaret Johnson was born August 26, 1919 at Goodridge, daughter of the late Torjus and Sophie (Riis) Larson. She was raised and attended school near Goodridge. She was baptized and confirmed at the Telemarken Lutheran Church. In November 1937 she was united in marriage to Willard Johnson at Goodridge. The couple made their home in Smiley Township near Thief River Falls.

#### Barb's "Fresh Peach Delight"

Melt and <u>cool</u>: 18 large marshmallows 1/2 cup milk


Add to above mixture: 3/4 cup cream whipped (Barb uses 2 cups Cool Whip and no sugar) 1 tbsp. sugar

Add:

1/2 tsp. vanilla

1-1/2 cups fresh peaches, cut into small pieces

Pour into a 9x13 graham cracker crust. Top with crumbs and chill. (Barb doubled the filling recipe in order to make the 2" high serving we enjoyed. If you want your servings to be thinner, use the recipe as is.)

#### Where was the Hamar Church located?

The Hamar Congregation joined with St. Pauli Church in 1917 and their church records containing baptisms and weddings were turned over to St. Pauli at that time. The last Hamar baptism was Earl Paul Engelstad, son of Paul and Olive Engelstad on May 28, 1917. The last Hamar wedding was Helmer and Mildred Finstad on July 27, 1917.

Older members of our congregation recall that the church was located near the Finstad farm and this is borne out by the 1911 map of the southeast corner of Rockbury township. A church is noted in Section 23 in the SE corner of the property belonging to Knut H. Finstad. If anyone has a photo of the Hamar Church, we would love to add it to our website.

You will also see St. Pauli's location in the SE corner of Section 25 on land originally belonging to Hans Amundson.


This map reminds us, too, that when conducting genealogy searches, names are often misspelled, incorrect, or different from what we are expecting. Note the spelling of the property in Section 25 belonging to Ole "Mackson."

In the map to the right below from 1909 for the same sections in Rocksbury township, you will see that O. Mathson's name is spelled correctly, but that the St. Pauli church is located at the cemetery.

Hamar Church does not appear anywhere on this map. They do, however, have School District 154 (Cheerville) correctly identified on both maps.

An example of an unexpected name is found in the Smiley township maps (not shown here). Most of us know that Tollef Erickson had the farm where Ken Geske now lives. The 1909 map shows the owner as "T. E. Skredergaarden." *Gaard* in Norwegian means 'farm' and this could give a genealogist a clue as to where Tollef came from in Norway, but he or she wouldn't find either "Tollef" or "Erickson" on this map. On the 1911 map, however, the listing is "Tollef E. Skredergordon," which would help, but someone has now anglisized the spelling of *gaard*.

Does all of this make you curious? Township maps of Pennington and Red Lake counties can be found on the Pennington County Historical Society webpage: pvillage.org. Simply go to "Maps" and you will see a listing by township for 1909 and 1911.
