Historic Minutes of the St. Pauli Congregation

21 January 1915

A special meeting with the congregation was held at H. J. Torstveit's on January 21,1915. Pastor Gryting was elected to be chairman, then A. A. Odegaard informed about why the meeting had been called; namely that the building committee wanted to know whether the members of the congregation would transport gravel for the basement under the church and perform some other transport that might be needed.

It was decided that the members of the congregation should drive loads with gravel and help to dig a hole for the basement under the church. And that, those who could not drive should pay two dollars for every load they should have driven. The rest was left to the building committee.

Then the meeting was ended.

13 December 1915

The St. Pauli congregation held its annual meeting in the church on December 13, 1915.

The meeting was opened with hymn song and prayer by Pastor Gryting. Then the report of the secretary was read and accepted.

After which the trustees in District 1 through A. A. Odegaard that everything in his district had turned out well, and that Hans Amundson has paid to the congregation the one hundred dollars he had promised.

Ole Helgesen reported from District 2 that he had not been able to collect the sum that was expected from the members of the congregation in his district.

John Kval reported from District 3 that everything in his district was going well.

There were some discussions about what should be done with such members of the congregation who did not want to contribute to the expenses of the congregation, and it was left to the pastor to talk to them about it.

Then the report of the treasurer was read and accepted.

After that, Oscar Seeland and wife and children (Ruth and Mabel) were admitted to the congregation.

The cemetery committee reported that the cemetery had been surveyed and that it would not be (*illegible*) as soon as possible, and it was left to the secretary to send the Hamar congregation an invoice for the expenses there had been for the cemetery, so that they might pay their share.

J. Kval reported on behalf of the school committee that the Ladies Aid took care of the school so the committee did not have to.

More was reported that there had been held two months of religion school and that Pastor Gryting had been teacher.

Then a building committee was elected, the same as before, namely A. A. Odegaard, T. Stene, and C. Oien. A.A. Odegaard reported on behalf of the building committee that it was the greatest hope and wish of the building committee that the members of the congregation would help so they could have the church repaired and they then could have it consecrated and the foundation stone laid. C. Oien reported that some gravel had arrived, but not as much as is needed and that they have a contractor who could perform the job, but they did not have the materials necessary to do it. It was proposed and supported that the building committee should contact the young people if possible to make them help with some of the transport.

Thereafter the following officials were elected:

As trustee for three years: A. A. Odegaard As secretary for one year: O. Odegaard As treasurer for one year: H. Torstveit

As sexton for one year: O. Seeland and as salary for the

same seven dollars

A school committee was elected the same as before. Lignings committee the same as before. As deputy to the Synod in Minneapolis was elected A. A. Odegaard, and Ole Valsvik and C. Oien were elected as substitutes. And the congregation decided that their deputy should vote for the majority outlook and the congregation should pay half of the costs for travel for the deputies.

As deputies to the district meeting this year were elected A. A. Odegaard, O. Peterson, Ole Valsvik and Ole Helgesen.

It was decided that the pastor's salary should be \$135.00 for the coming year.

On proposal the meeting was ended.

We then heard a report by Beverly Rolandson on her trip to the Luther League Convention at Moorhead, MN. The congregation sang "Oh, Happy Day When You Shalt Stand."

The business of the last two meetings were read by Vice President Doris Belange in the absence of the secretary and were approved as read.

There was no old business but for new business the president read a letter from the Augsburg Publishing Company.

A motion was made and seconded that we pay for the Luther League party out of Luther League funds.

We closed by praying the Lord's Prayer and singing the table blessing.

Hostesses were Herman Rude, Edwin Nelson, Joe Belange and Theo. Bjorge families.

Father's Day Sermon Pastor Carl Hanson June 16, 2013

Deuteronomy 6

Is there any father or grandfather here this morning, who, after your child or grandchild was born, kept them totally out of sight, never talked about them with anyone else, and, if someone asked about them, you responded with an embarrassed stammer? Now I don't know about you, but I've never met a father or grandfather who fits that description.

I can't think of a more surefire conversation starter than to ask about a father or grandfather about their new addition. Ask any question and out comes the smart phone with the pictures, or if you are a dumb grandpa like me, out comes the wallet with the photos. And then there are the stories about how wonderful and unique the child is. For father or grandfather not to talk about their pride and joy is about as difficult to imagine as a farmer not talking about the weather. You HAVE TO talk about your child. You let everyone know. The mere mention of their name brings a huge smile to your face. Even the most dignified adult breaks into "goos" and "coos" at the sight of any infant. With the passage of time, the excitement of having a child may become a little less obvious. But your sense of pride and joy and caring, and your willingness to talk about your child, is right next to the surface whether your child is 5 days or 50 years old.

As eager as we are to talk about our joys in and our hopes for our children, it seems to me that dads and granddads are often the opposite when it comes to speaking of God. To speak of God in public or even in our own homes is to die of terminal embarrassment. It is as if we are ashamed of having anything to do with God. Research shows that 50% of ELCA families don't speak of God with our own families. We often act about God as a 16 year old acts about their parents: wishing that their parents would drop out of sight and not embarrass us. My sense is that this reluctance to speak out about God is even more prevalent among Christian men than among Christian women.

Who are we hiding? Who is this that embarrasses us so that we do not pronounce God's name, except when we're here in the pews or when we smack golf ball into a water hazard or hit our finger with a hammer. God is the God who created us in partnership with our parents. God made us his own in Holy Baptism. God has given to us the blessing of children and brought them into his family in baptism. And now our children share in the greatest inheritance there is: the inheritance of eternal life with Christ and all of God's children.

What is there to hide? Who is there to hide? Listen to what God says to us through Moses: "You shall put these words of mine in your heart and soul, and you shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and fix them as an emblem on your forehead. Teach them to your children, talking about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise. Write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates."

God is saying that we are to wear our faith on our sleeve. "You shall put these words of mine in your heart and soul, and you shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and fix them as an emblem on your forehead." What's in our heart is displayed on our hand. As many wear a symbol of our marriage on our finger, so the adornment of a cross on our person and in our homes bears public witness to the God who saves us and reaches out to all of humanity in grace, mercy and peace. That's a God we want others to know about and to know, just as we want others to know about and know our spouse and our children.

Christianity is a personal faith...But it is not a private faith. There is a difference. Christianity is personal in the same sense that my relationships with Mary and each of our children and grandchildren are personal. These relationships are as personal and distinctive as each of us is personal and distinctive. And there are many aspects of our relationships that are private. But it is a matter of appropriate public knowledge that I wear this ring in witness of the relationship that I have with Mary. It is appropriate that my office is adorned with pictures of my children and grandchildren. I want others to know them because I am thankful for them and proud of them. So too our relationship with God is personal; but not private.

Scripture tells us that our personal and public witness to Jesus Christ begins at home. It doesn't end there, but does begin there. "Teach them to your children, talking about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you like down and when you rise." Children need to learn of their heavenly Father at home. For our children's most important and influential teachers go by the

names of dad and mom; and many times by the names of "grandpa" and "grandma." Despite the embarrassment of that 16 year old who might wish that you disappear for a while, your children and grandchildren want to know you. They want to know what you think, what you have experienced, what you feel and what you believe. If they don't know in whom you believe and what you believe, they will discover what others believe and go down other paths. I have a second verse to add to the first hymn that I ever learned. That verse goes like this: Jesus loves me. This I know because daddy and mommy tell me so.

I'm a numbers nut. I accumulate miscellaneous numbers and facts that are of varying value. Today's numbers are 85/60/45/15. They tell you about some odds. But I wouldn't suggest that you use them when buying a Powerball ticket. I think that these numbers are much more significant than the Powerball.

85......60.......45..........15. As Luther said, "What does this mean?"

- 85—If you were raised in a home where both your dad and mom worshipped regularly and faithfully, chances are 85% that you will worship faithfully and regularly as an adult.
- 60—If your Dad worshipped faithfully and regularly, but your Mom did not, chances are 60% that you will worship regularly when you are an adult.
- 45—If your Mom worshipped faithfully and regularly while you were growing up, but your Dad did not, chances are 45% that you will worship regularly as an adult.
- 15—If neither of your parents worshipped regularly as you were growing up, chances are 15% that you will worship regularly and faithfully as an adult.


Research shows that the example of Fathers is the single most important human factor in the future worship life of your children. Moms come in a close second. When it comes to religious faith and practice, children will most likely do what you do both now and later on in life. More than you may think, children will do what you do and avoid doing what you do not do. Our children need godly fathers and mothers, grandfathers and grandmothers more than anything else.

I grew up in a Christian home. My Dad and Mom might have missed worship one or two Sundays a year. Both my Grandpa and Grandma McFall and my Grandpa and Grandma Hansen worshipped regularly and faithfully. I thank God for the quiet and yet strong witness to the Christian faith that I absorbed as a child from gracious and godly parents and grandparents.

It is my prayer that our gracious and loving Heavenly Father will support, guide and bless all Fathers and Mothers and Grandfathers and Grandmothers in their ministry to the children and grandchildren entrusted to their care.

Amen.

Then, reaching under his pillow he pulled out some crumpled up bills. The man saw that the boy already had money, started to get angry again. The little boy slowly counted out his money, and then looked up at his father.

DAD: "Why do you want more money if you already have some?"

SON: "Because I didn't have enough, but now I do."

"Daddy, I have \$100 now. Can I buy an hour of your time? Please come home early tomorrow. I would like to have dinner with you."

The father was crushed. He put his arms around his little son, and he begged for his forgiveness.

It's just a short reminder to all of you working so hard in life. We should not let time slip through our fingers without having spent some time with those who really matter to us, those close to our hearts. Do remember to share that \$100 worth of your time with someone you love? If we die tomorrow, the company that we are working for could easily replace us in a matter of days. But the family and friends we leave behind will feel the loss for the rest of their lives. And come to think of it, we pour ourselves more into work than to our family.



chromatic button instrument similar to the one in the photo on the left). This was not your customary Whoopee John music we all know! These accordions weigh about three times as much as the more familiar keyed instruments and are too heavy to play standing up. Instead, they rest on the player's left thigh and the musicians use the movement of their entire upper body to help squeeze the bellows as they play. The instrument has three registers, which the player changes by pressing her/his chin on the appropriate button on the top of the accordion.
