Minutes of the Church Council

March 17, 2016

The St. Pauli Church Council held its regular meeting on Thursday, March 17, 2015 at 7 p.m. at St. Pauli Church.

Members present: Arlo Rude, Cindy Cedergren, Kathy Alberg, Gary Iverson and Pastor Carl Hansen.

The meeting was called to order by Arlo Rude. Pastor Hansen opened with prayer.

<u>Approval of Agenda:</u> The agenda was approved as presented.

<u>Secretary's Report:</u> The minutes of the February 15th meeting were approved as presented.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> The Treasurer's Report was provided by Ruse and after he amended the January and February reports, they were approved. He noted that the amount listed for the Memorial Fund was listed incorrectly in those reports.

General Fund

Rude also provided a St. Pauli Cemetery Association checking account report, which included all donations for 2015. 2015 donations totaled \$6,370. Expenses totaled \$857.05, but \$840.00 of that total was reimbursed from the church general fund. Checking account balance as of 12/31/15 was \$26,788.08.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Hansen stated that from his perspective and that of his pastoral colleagues, they were pleased with congregational participation in the Wednesday Lenten Series on Faith Practices. He stated he used to be reluctant to participate in round robins because of relatively poor attendance. That was definitely not the case among the ELCA congregations in and around TRF. He hopes and anticipates that we will continue with these kinds of series in the future. The use of Holden Evening Prayer (which was actually written as an Advent service) really enhances congregational participation in making a joyful noise to the Lord.

It was wonderful to see the new chair lift in action at worship on March 16. One of the most important things that any congregation does is to make worship accessible and welcoming for all people. He is delighted that this is the kind of spirit we have at St. Pauli.

Pastor Hansen heartily supports the proposal to match member gifts for flood relief (through Lutheran Disaster Relief) up to \$500. Caring for those in special need is a vital ministry of all of God's people.

Pastor Hansen reported he continues to be blessed by the two pastors' Bible Study groups that he attends each week one in Thief River Falls and one in Crookston. Input fro a variety of pastors helps us all keep our eyes on who and what is truly important as Christians.

Reports of Members in sickness or distress: Council members shared prayer concerns of members.

New Members or Interest in Membership: Pastor Hansen contacted a family who may be potential members.

Reports:

- WELCA: Items for personal care kits are being collected from the congregation through March 20. Easter breakfast is planned for 9 am following services.
- 2) Board of Education: Confirmation classes will resume on March 30, following a break during Lent.

<u>Old Business:</u> Rude reported that the church's insurance deductible is \$500, not \$1,000 as originally reported.

New Business:

- Change in Food Shelf Month for 2017: It was recommended that in order to maximize the funds given to the Food Shelf, the church should consider changing one of their designated months to March, instead of April. Typically, matching funds from other sources are higher in the month of March. There was no objection to making that change starting in 2017. December can remain as the other designated month.
- 2) Donation to ELCA Disaster Relief: In response to a request to congregations from the ELCA Disaster Relief Organization, Rude made a recommendation to seek donations from the congregation over the next few weeks, and for the Council to approve matching the donations, up to \$500 from the general fund. Motion was made by Iverson, seconded by Cedergren. Motion carried. Notices will be included in the bulletins and monthly newsletter, with a cut-off date of April 10.
- Financial Review: Rude reported he had gone through the checking account for 2015. He will prepare a report on this findings and email it to the Council.
- 4) Fireplace Installation: On a related topic, Rude reviewed the system needed for draining the water system in case of heat loss due to a major winter storm.

It was noted that RV anti-freeze could be kept on hand for such an emergency. He also reported that the cement on the west wall is not in strong enough condition to be cut into. An electric unit may be another option. The committee to discuss the fireplace has not yet contacted Rude to meet.

Next regular meeting date: April 21, 2016. The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer and adjourned at 8 pm.




LWR QUILTS REACH BY Nikki Massle, LWR's Staff Writer EARTHQUAKE SHAKEN NEPAL

It took years for Kamal Bahadur Gurung to build a house for his family in the Lamjung district of Nepal. But it took just moment for April 2015's devastating earthquake to nearly destroy it. Thankfully, he, his wife, children and mother are all safe. Now the family faces the long journey to recovery.

The devastating earthquake that struck Nepal destroyed more than a half-million homes, claimed thousands of lives and left many people in need of humanitarian aid.

LWR has worked in Nepal since 2009 and was able to quickly mobilize to reach out to people in need





"We focused on very remote communities," says Umer Khan, LWR's senior director for emergency operations. These communities are hours away from the nearest hub and often not even accessible by roads, making it harder for emergency responders to reach out with help.

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READER PICKS

All three books this month are recommended by Jan Strandlie.

The Devil in the White City; Murder, Magic, and Madness at the Fair That Changed America by Erik Larson. Chicago, Illinois, budding (but boring and dirty) U.S. industrial city on the banks of Lake Michigan, makes a bid to host the 1893 World's Fair and vows to outdo Paris which had come up with the incredible Eiffel Tower for their extravaganza a few years prior. Jan is amazed at the research by Larson and how he could weave the facts of what went into this architectural undertaking with the story of the grisly acts of a cunning serial killer, all happening at the same time. It's a unique story of an actual piece of the history of America that reads like a novel.

<u>The Bean Trees</u> by Barbara Kingsolver (author of *The Poisonwood Bible*, one of Jan's all-time favorite novels). It's mid-1970's probably, and Missy is determined to get herself out of Pittman County, Kentucky, change her name, and make a new life for herself. While this is a sad story of poverty and disenchantment, it is so cleverly written and brings the characters to life in such a way that you can "see" them and just know you've met these people. And, if you're reading it in public, you might look around to see who has heard you laugh out loud!

Katherine by Anya Seton is a historical novel about a true love story of Old England between a married (however, not by choice) young woman and John of Gaunt, the Duke of Lancaster, son of the king. The results of this love affair created some of the royal family that we know today. It is history that comes alive by placing you in that setting and making you feel the emotion. Jan says she first read this book at age 16 and then reread it again about 40 years later...with a completely different perspective, and loved it just the same.



The TumbleBooks Library collection of e-books and animated talking picture books has nearly 1,000 titles, with content appropriate for those in preK- 6th grade. It includes videos, playlists, books in languages other than English such as French and Spanish, graphic novels and math stories. To go along with the books are quizzes, educational games and puzzles which focus on both math and language skills. Each title has recommended reading levels for Grades, Lexile, and Accelerated Reader.

TumbleBooks are accessed through the Northwest Regional Library website either from within the library or from a personal computer/device at www.nwrlib.org. A current library card is required to access the TumbleBooks Library from locations outside of the local library.

Northwest Regional Library System has branches located in Greenbush, Hallock, Red Lake Falls, Roseau, Thief River Falls, Warren, Warroad, and link sites in Grygla and Karlstad.

Between its return on March 21 and March 31, there were 252 views (checkouts). In the first 7 days of April: 106 views.

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TRF Chamber of Commerce gives Faye Auchenpaugh "Honorary Member" Award

The 2016 honorary member award was presented to Faye Auchenpaugh during the Chamber's annual banquet on Thursday, April 7. The recipient is determined by the Board of Directors and given to an individual who has made significant contributions to the community.

A native of the Thief River Falls area, Auchenpaugh moved away from the community for several years before returning in 1996.

Auchenpaugh is active in the Sons of Norway as treasurer, the Thief River Falls Downtown Development Association, organist and WELCA president at St. Pauli Lutheran Church, clerk for Smiley Township, board member for the Northwest Minnesota Foundation, board member for the Northwest Minnesota Arts Council, board member for the Northland College Foundation, and board member for the Thief River Falls Library.

Auchenpaugh has authored many grant proposals for smaller organizations, and, since 2000, she has brought approximately \$16 million to the region through various grants.

Auchenpaugh has served on the Pennington County Centennial Committee. She initiated the "Save the Carnegie" project. She led an effort to bring the "Barn Again" Smithsonian exhibit to Thief River Falls, and she is also working on a project aimed at saving a country school.
